The Rev. Dr. Luk De Volder is coming to New Haven from Clermont-Ferrand, France, where he has been Rector at Christ Church, having earlier served there since 2005 as Vicar. Christ Church is a parish in the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, and ministers to expatriate Americans working and living in France. Born and educated in Brussels, Belgium, Luk (pronounced "Luke") is fluent in English, Dutch and French.

Luk served as an ordained priest in the Roman Catholic Church for six years before being received into the Episcopal Church in 2005. He is an eager learner. His study in theology, spirituality and church leadership has been especially rewarding to him. He earned his Ph.D. in theology

and liturgy from Catholic University in Louvain, Belgium in 2003.

Luk is married to Tiffany Israel, a doctoral candidate in theology, who comes from Boston, Mass. Luk and Tiffany are looking forward to being part of the Trinity family and the greater New Haven community.

Reflecting on his recent work at Christ Church, Luk writes: "I have learned to be flexible and understand that we are becoming and are not a finished product. This frame of reference has allowed me to see the joy and humor in the process and to be certain that anything I as the Rector or we as a community accomplish is only possible through the beating wings of the Holy Spirit. I have learned to work with passion and strategy, but not to take myself too seriously. There is a great God after all. And the parish grows."

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Vestry Highlights: April

Approval of Minutes of March 21, 2011, Meeting: It was MOVED and SECONDED that the minutes of the Vestry meeting held on March 21, 2011, be approved. The minutes were unanimously approved.

The Vestry discussed what Trinity can do to assist St. Paul and St. James following the vandalism there. Insurance will cover most of the repairs, but there is a need to replace the front door to prevent further break-ins. It was MOVED and SECONDED that the offering on Palm Sunday be designated for St. Paul and St. James. The motion PASSED unanimously. It was further MOVED and SECONDED that the Grants Committee be asked to consider additional funding for St. Paul and St. James. The motion PASSED.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer circulated a written report. The Search Committee expenses in 2010 were paid from the endowment. The 2011 expenses for the cost of moving and immigration fees will likely exceed the budgeted amount of \$14,000, but will be offset by savings in the Associate Rector's position. The accountant's fees will likely exceed the budgeted amount of \$11,000 due to 2010 costs of reporting on the construction project and transitioning some tasks to Sherrill. Of 2011 pledges, 30% has been collected. The Finance Team has set a schedule for the rest of the year. The issue of finding a successor to the Treasurer will be kept under advisement.

Interim Rector's Report: The Interim Rector submitted a written report on the subject of the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (CEEP), which was discussed by the Vestry later in the meeting. Jim reported that a rededication of the stained glass windows which have been restored will take place in May. He will look for people with family history and association with the windows and their restoration for this event. Since this was Lucy's last Vestry meeting at, she was given special recognition of her tenure at Trinity.

Associate Rector's Report: The Associate Rector submitted a written report. She outlined Carol Davidson's proposal for extending the lunch project at the Atwater Senior Center. Linda Sheehan and Ellen Freiler were recognized for their contribution to the Wednesday evening Lenten program. Bishop Laura has been holding conversations with New Haven churches, and a group visited the 9 o'clock service at Trinity to see where the Holy Spirit is working in New Haven. One project is a city-wide Youth Group which will officially start in September. Candy Carl-Stannard and Rich Walser are working with lay leadership from other parishes on this

project. Lucy expressed her thanks for a wonderful eight months at Trinity. Her last day in the office will be the Thursday after Easter. The Vestry requested that Lucy give Trinity her views based on her experiences with us.

Wardens' Report: Barb Hedberg reported that she has communicated with the Rector-elect, who will meet with U.S. Immigration in Paris on May 2. On Saturday, June 4, from 4 to 6, there will be a farewell party for Jim and Ellen Sell at Ralph and Mary Ann Stroup's, to which the Vestry are invited to bring appetizers and desserts. Margie Pikaart is leading the Transition Committee.

Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (CEEP): Barbara Lamb reported that she had found CEEP to be invaluable in connection with the work of the Grants Committee. She met with Pam Gomez and was put in touch with similar parishes around the country, which contributed useful information. Barbara recommends that Trinity consider joining CEEP. There are 7 Connecticut parishes which belong. CEEP has an annual conference, which provides information about managing endowments, stewardship, parish administration, church policies and other areas. Dues are based on the size of the endowment and would be about \$3,000 for Trinity. CEEP could provide a resource for our new Rector. It would be possible to join CEEP for \$750 for the remainder of 2011. There is a possibility of visitors attending the annual conference for a first year without joining. The consensus of the Vestry was to put this suggestion on hold for now and revisit it in 6 months.

New Haven Youth Group: Rich Walser asked for help in identifying youth leaders in the parish.

Community Works: At the meeting on the Community Works Committee on March 28, Ellen Freiler presented a proposal to expand the Tons of Food project to a year-round endeavor.

Mission Discernment Initiative: The Bishop's initiative involving "Telling Our Stories" was discussed.

Parish Teams: It was suggested that the Vestry agenda be set to reflect the Teams and their responsibilities under the Guidelines, with an item for "continuing business" so that there will be ongoing discussion of the parish Teams.

The 9 o'clock Service: There will be an open discussion about the 9 o'clock service at an Adult Forum in May.

Vestry Highlights: May

Approval of Minutes of April 11, 2011, Meeting: It was MOVED and SECONDED that the minutes of the Vestry meeting held on April, 2011, be approved. The minutes will be revised to reflect the means of collecting the Palm Sunday offering and to indicate that there will be a year-long Community Works Committee effort with respect to food collection. The minutes were unanimously approved as amended.

Mary Ann Stroup presented the version of the Vestry Agenda which follows the Parish Teams and is a format which can be

used for reporting at all Vestry meetings. There is currently a need for a Vestry member to act as a liaison to the Spiritual Life and Nominating Committees. Mary Ann reported that there will be a Governance Committee meeting on Thursday, May 19, to which all who are interested are invited.

Interim Rector's Report: The Interim Rector submitted a written report. He introduced Deacon Kyle Pedersen, a New Haven native and a founder of Chapel on the Green, who has been at Trinity during the month of May. Jim stated that

Bishop Ahrens is willing to assign Kyle to Trinity for the at least the next few months. He would be available for 10 hours per week, while continuing his employment at Connecticut Mental Health Center as a social worker. It was recommended that Kyle be available to attend staff meetings right away. In his capacity as Deacon for the New Haven area, Kyle will be at Trinity to assist in the transition process. Jim will contact Bishop Ahrens to indicate Trinity's support for Kyle's presence at Trinity. On June 5, 2011, there will be a rededication of the restored stained glass windows.

Wardens' Report: Barb Hedberg reported that Luk and Tiffany have found temporary housing on Fountain Street in Westville. The Transition Committee headed by Margie Pikaart consists of Duo Dickinson, Jenny Briggs, Martha and Mark Lawless, Carolyn Gould, and the Wardens. Luk and Tiffany will arrive a few days before June 13, probably the preceding Thursday or Friday. If Luk wishes and initiates this, there can be some overlap with Jim.

Treasurer's Report: Heather reported that she is working with the Finance Team to wrap up the Capital Campaign and project anticipated returns.

Finance Team: Sara Stadler stated that at its recent meeting, the Finance Team received a report from Harper & Whitefield for calendar 2009. The policy of the Diocese is that if a church receives revenue of more than \$500,000, there should be an annual audit. The Finance Team is looking for an accounting firm to conduct an audit for Trinity. The Finance Team will meet with the Properties Committee on May 23 and will be meeting with all of the Teams in the future to discuss needs.

Nominating Committee: The Committee will be composed of volunteers from among retiring Vestry members, to consider replacing the Treasurer and filling Vestry positions.

Communications Committee: There is a need for a liaison between the Vestry and the Communications Committee.

Pastoral Care: Barbara Fennelly reported that prayer shawls will be blessed on Sunday, May 22. She is working on a backup for the Circle of Caring when Gloria Hoda is not available. David Phelps will head up parish visiting and investigate the Stephen's Ministry. Bill Taylor is getting safe church training. The healing ministry continues to be very strong.

Parish Life: Laura Davis stated that a 20s/30s group may be rejuvenated. Carol Davidson reported that the Home Board will hold a Spring luncheon at the New Have Country Club on May 26. Gloria Hoda spoke about the ECW (Episcopal Church Women) meeting on May 10, which was attended by 20 people; \$50 was collected for the "pounding". There will be an ECW meeting in the fall to discuss ECW. The meetings may now be held on Monday night to permit convening at an earlier hour.

Outreach/Evangelism: Murray will have a Team meeting to discuss continuing programs.

Parking: It will now be possible to have Monday meetings on demand to Sherrill. It was suggested that Monday meet-

ings be coordinated so that more than one meeting can be held on the same day to cut down on expenses.

Yale-New Haven Hospital Bed Fund: Carolyn Gould reported that she is in the process of trying to contact the individual in charge of the funds at the hospital, to determine the breadth of the purposes for which the funds held there may be used.

The 9 o'clock Service: The Adult Forum on Sunday, May 22, will provide and opportunity for parishioners to express their feelings about changes made to the service and to present constructive ideas for going forward.

Vestry Portal: Rich Walser presented a mock-up of a way to organize information about Committees according to Team on the Trinity website. He met with the Communications and Governance Committees to provide link for the Teams and Committees to the main website as a means to let parishioners know what is going on in the Committees. The committees can organize their own sites, with links to their documents and related sites.

Exit Interview with Jim Sell: The Vestry had the opportunity to hear the Interim Rector's views of Trinity. He will also make a presentation at the last Adult Forum before he leaves Trinity. He expressed the view that the new Rector will likely want to meet with the retired Rector. Trinity is the most unique parish he has ever served. Luk is a stunning choice; he is young enough to start a youth group and attract young families. We have to be aggressive about evangelism and church growth in this day and age. He found at Trinity plenty of interest in "who is Jesus and what does he has to say to me." Trinity is less "secularized" than we think we are. For Jim, the only stories he knows to be true are his personal stories. If we love, support, enable and inspire Luk, he will have a wonderful opportunity at Trinity.



Chris Evans steps down as Coordinator of Chapel on the Green

Chris Evans, the Coordinator of the Chapel on the Green, has announced that he will be stepping down from that position in the middle of June. He made this announcement recently to the Advisory Board at their regular meeting. Chris has had to make this decision due to other professional and personal commitments.

In reflecting upon his work, Jim Sell said recently, "Chris has been extraordinary.

The whole program has grown beautifully under him. He just seemed born for the job. He is so respectful of each worshiper and treats everyone with dignity. He has expanded the number of participating churches to congregations throughout the Diocese of Connecticut. We have been so fortunate to have him."

After Chris steps down June 15, Catherine Amon will act as the Interim Coordinator for three months, while a successor is found. Catherine is a seminarian, seeking ordination and a member of Trinity.

The Rev. Kyle Pedersen to extend his stay at Trinity



The Rev. Kyle Pedersen, a Deacon in the Diocese of Connecticut, has been connected to Trinity during the month of May. This has come about through a process he has been engaged in with the Rt. Rev. Laura Ahrens, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese. He has proven to be a great gift to us in the period when Lucy moved on and Jim is wrapping up his ministry here.

After his very timely presence among us, Bishop Ahrens has elected to keep him at Trinity for at least several more months as we transition from the interim period to the new ministry of the Rev. Luk De Volder.

This comes with the full approval of our vestry and the Rector-elect.

Kyle brings great gifts and experiences to us in this critical time. A graduate of Yale Divinity School and a trained mental health professional in New Haven, Kyle knows the Diocese of Connecticut, the city of New Haven and the Episcopal churches in the area. He has had a long involvement with Trinity, having served as one of the founding members of the Chapel on the Green.

We expect Kyle to be an important resource for Luk as Luk begins to get introduced to the like and ministry of our church.

Kyle will be giving ten hours of service to the church. He will help with worship three Sundays a month and seek to make connections with us through other ministries.

Restoring a Cultural Treasure on Chapel Street

Think "cultural treasure" and "Chapel Street" and a few obvious associations come to mind: each season's galaxy of offerings at the Yale Rep; paintings by Hogarth, Gainsborough, Constable, and other English contemporaries at the Yale Center for British Art; the extensive collection of American art at the Yale University Art Gallery.

Three blocks east on the Green, at the corner of Chapel and Temple Streets, sits another example, less well-known to many, but also one of New Haven's significant cultural treasures.

Trinity parish was founded in 1752. The main part of the Trinity Church building—one of America's earliest examples of Gothic Revival architecture—was completed in 1815. Trinity's distinctive exterior—brown rough-hewn sandstone quarried in Hamden—houses a remarkable collection of stained glass windows.

The windows—originally clear panes set in movable sashes—began transformation to stained glass in 1871. The most recent installation on the main floor occurred in 1968. Above the entrance on Temple Street, another window, commissioned to celebrate the church's 250th anniversary, was installed in 2002. Backlit, it shines out nightly over the Green, a beacon to all who pass by.

Renowned American artists crafted windows for the church, including works by the studios of Nicola D'Ascenzo, Charles Connick and Louis Comfort Tiffany.

Over decades, the relentless forces of New England weather, vehicular exhaust and industrial pollution took their toll on the original stained glass collection. Cracks appeared, as windows weakened and buckled under their own weight. Accumulation of grime and moisture discolored many sections. Many windows suffered significant damage. Some were irreplaceable originals.



In the mid-90s, Trinity undertook a long-term project to restore damaged windows and provide for ongoing maintenance. The church started its annual Holiday Bazaar to provide a primary and continuing source of project funds. In April this year, the initial phase of restoration ended. Henceforth, ongoing maintenance and repair will ensure future preservation.

On **Sunday, June 5th**, at its **10:00 a.m.** service, Trinity will recognize completion of the initial phase of the project by rededicating the stained glass windows. The congregation warmly invites visitors to join the celebration and the festive coffee hour that will follow.

This is our legacy - The restoration of the stained glass windows of Trinity Church on the Green



The history of our stained glass windows began in 1871. In Ed Getlein's history of the parish, he wrote that, "The Annual Meeting of that year authorized the Vestry to change all the windows to stained glass, at 'a cost not to exceed \$2,000.'" "What they had in mind," he continued, "were the simple grisaille windows with a design stenciled on the glass; two or three examples of which remain in the church to this day. It was, however, but the beginning of a conversion from plain glass to the grandeur that is more jewel than window." (Grisaille, pronounced griz-eye, is a painting term that means "gray tones".)

From about 1903 until 1968, the creation and installation of our windows was undertaken. They are a patrimony of artistic excellence and exquisite value for us.



The restoration of them began in 1998 and was completed on Easter Eve, 2011. Over these years, the Holiday Bazaar raised a total of \$338,099. From that, \$270,907 has been spent on the restoration of the windows. This work consisted of dismantling, cleaning, recaming (replacing the lead around the glass), providing state of the art exterior protection and other such details that might be required.

Circling around the sanctuary, from a starting point just to the left of the entrance, one can first see the Road to Emmaus. This window, given in memory of the Rev. Edwin Harwood, Rector from 1859-1894, was executed by the L. C. Tiffany Company of New York in 1910.

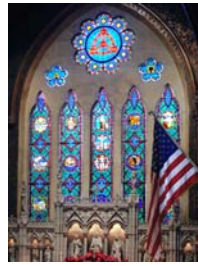


The second window, St. Paul preaching on Mars Hill, was also executed by Tiffany. It was given in 1897 in memory of William W. Boardman and Lucy Hall Boardman (1819-1906). It was installed in 1903.

The third window, installed in 1903, is Easter morning, with the angel addressing the two Marys. It was given in memory of

Thomas Attwater Barnes and his wife, Phebe Bryan Phipps (Fran Hofmeister's family.) It is Trinity's third Tiffany work of art.

The fourth window represents the Annunciation by the angel Gabriel to Mary. It was given in 1927, in memory of Matthew Howey, Sara J. Howey and Emily A. Howey Garwood. It was executed by the Philadelphia firm of D'Ascenzo and Company.



Over 2005 and 2006, the west window was restored. This is a five-lancet window surmounted by a rose window. These lancets contain a variety of signs and symbols of the faith of the Christian church. The rose window bears the doctrine of the Trinity. This window was originally installed in 1885. "Although the maker of this window is unknown, it is believed to be of either American or Belgian origin." (Ed Getlein, *Here will I dwell*, 216.)

The sixth window behind the chapel reredos, is the second window executed by D'Ascenzo. It was installed in 1926 and given in memory of A. Heaton Robertson (1849-1924). It depicts Christ's Sermon on the Mount.



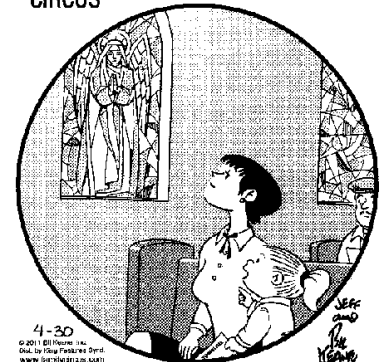
The seventh window is the last of Trinity's four Tiffany windows. It was installed in 1912 and depicts the Adoration of the Magi. It was given in memory of the Rev. John M. Garfield, DD, and his wife, Nancy Lyon Garfield and the Rev. Nathaniel Lyon Garfield and his wife, Harriet Clark Garfield.

The next window was not one that required immediate restoration. However, an external protective cover was provided. As mentioned above, this grisaille window is one of the original windows (others can be seen elsewhere in the church). It is made up of grey geometric designs stenciled on clear glass. It was installed in the 1870's.



The ninth window was installed in 1968. Executed by Charles Connick and Associates of Boston, it depicts a scene from the youth of Jesus, with Mary and Joseph. It was given in memory of Frederick Foster Brewster and Margaret Fitch Brewster.

The Windows and the Bazaar - its history and our legacy

This oral history was recently recounted to Jim Sell by Mary Ann Stroup. We would welcome refinements, additions and corrections so it can be part of the history of Trinity, with as much accuracy as our memories allow.



Mary Ann: Back in 1994, Trinity was ending the year about **\$30,000** in debt. So, Peggy Pschirrer and Pat Cavanagh got together and hatched a plan—The Great Tea Bag Caper—a way of raising money, but without the tea and without the

party! Just send a contribution and you can stay home. They raised over **\$6,000**.

The following year, they decided to be a little bit more intentional and created a “Christmas Corner” held several Sunday’s in December during Coffee Hour. It was mostly purchased things that had been gathered together for sale. Features of that day were Len Goss’s home made mincemeat, Peg’s homemade plum pudding and the famous Trinity mug.



The Christmas corner was so popular that it was expanded to include Peg’s special homemade pies and Barclay Smith’s Balsam Christmas Center pieces—preorder only. As Mary Ann recalls, that was probably her first year as chairperson with Pat Cavanagh.

In 1998 the Christmas Corner was first opened to the public on Saturdays.

Up throughout that time, the income received was used help fund the Properties committee’s budget and unexpected repairs. The goal was to build a Properties reserve. Enthusiasm grew and interest beyond the congregation developed.

So, by 2002, its name was changed to the Holiday Bazaar and opened for sales on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. It was called the “Holiday Bazaar” rather than the “Christmas Bazaar” in order to offer items with non-Christmas themes and to be more inclusive to New Haven’s broad-based community.

In 2000, Duo Dickinson became the chair of the Properties committee. Also serving on that committee were Mary Ann and Ed Getlein. Duo made the case to them that our very valuable and deeply loved stained glass windows were suffering from serious weather and age-related complications. If restoration did not begin soon, irreparable harm would come to them.

And so, by agreement between the Bazaar committee, the Properties committee and the Vestry, the income from the Bazaar began to be directed toward the restoration of the windows.

By this point the Bazaar had an army of volunteers and was yielding an average of about **\$30,000** per year in income and had already funded the money to restore the Road to Emmaus window in 1998. Since that time, nearly **\$300,000** has been spent to restore Trinity’s stained glass windows. All of the critical work has been accomplished. Not every window needed immediate work, but the ones in greatest jeopardy have been repaired.

The whole job has been a gift of love. Every parishioner and many of our friends have had a hand in it. Whether they were the chair of a Bazaar committee or made a purchase at the cookie table, they contributed to the restoration of our windows. This bazaar, thread by thread, has woven a fabric among everyone at Trinity. We received these beautiful windows from prior generations of worshipers. We leave our legacy of repaired and restored windows to the coming generations.

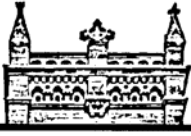
